

Ronald McKinnon is the William D. Eberle Professor of International Economics at Stanford University, where he has taught since 1961. His fields of specialization are international economics and development finance. His most recent research and consulting interest has been on China. He has been awarded honorary professorships in five Chinese universities, and his “selected works in economics” have been translated into Chinese in a collection of seven bound volumes presented in 2006.

His books, which have also been translated into several European and other Asian languages, include *Money and Capital in Economic Development* (1973), *Money in International Exchange: The Convertible-Currency System* (1979), *The Order of Economic Liberalization: Financial Control in the Transition to a Market Economy* 2nd edition (1993), *The Rules of the Game: International Money and Exchange Rates*, (1996), *Dollar and Yen: Resolving Economic Conflict Between the United States and Japan* (1997, with Kenichi Ohno). His latest book, *Exchange Rates under the East Asian Dollar Standard: Living with Conflicted Virtue* has been published by the MIT Press in 2005.

McKinnon has been a consultant to central banks and finance ministries the world over, including international agencies such as the World Bank and International Monetary Fund.
